- Established in 2016
- 27 ministry-level authorities
- Annual meetings and campaigns

Domestic cooperation

Working group on preventing and combating Internet illegal wildlife trade Wildlife Jurisdiction Authorities + web enterprises + volunteer teams + experts+ etc

Ministry-level special crackdown operations

Qingfeng Action, Operation Kunlun, Operation National Sword Wildlife Jurisdiction Authorities organized nationwide joint operations

International cooperation

Capacity building

2) Key communication and collaboration challenges identified within the network and with other networks.

- > Discrepancies in legislation among different Parties in terms of combating wildlife crime.
- > Existing instruments or mechanisms of combating wildlife crime are under-utilized.
- ➤ Confidential information and privacy policy increase the difficulty of combating wildlife crimes.
- > Dedicated channel for communication are largely insufficient.





> To regard wildlife crime a serious crime and to reflect so in legislation.

➤ To produce a guidance of the boundary between the privacy protection and the information sharing.

> To establish and promote the use of secured channel to facilitate intelligence sharing.

➤ To interpret seizure data in a more objective manner and create a cooperation-friendly environment.
